

# California Office of Historic Preservation's Built Environment Resources Directory Users' Guide

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## INTRODUCTION

The Built Environment Resource Directory (BERD) contains information regarding built environment cultural resources that are included in the California Office of Historic Preservation's (OHP) Tracking and Inventory System (OTIS). The resources were submitted to the Office of Historic Preservation through one of its programs (Registration, Review and Compliance, Local Government Surveys, Architectural Review, etc.). This Users' Guide provides an explanation of terminology found in the BERD that will aid users in understanding legal status codes.

Note that database errors and omissions exist, and will be corrected when identified and as time allows. All data values, including address information, are based upon the documentation provided to and processed by OHP, and only reflect current information that OHP has processed. Should a researcher identify discrepancies, please bring them to the attention of the respective Information Center coordinator.

Out of an abundance of caution, resources that are potentially archeological are excluded from the directory to prevent theft and damage. Site data is restricted and maintained by the California Historical Resources Information System's (CHRIS) regional information centers listed at [http://ohp.parks.ca.gov/pages/1068/files/IC\\_Roster\\_03-22-2019.pdf](http://ohp.parks.ca.gov/pages/1068/files/IC_Roster_03-22-2019.pdf).

OHP produces the BERD from the OTIS database as an Excel spreadsheet, with following information columns:

<b>Evaluation Information</b>	<p>Contains sets of linked data with a status code, evaluation date, and evaluation identifier. When a resources has more than one evaluation, the evaluations are separated with a   (pipe). The column consolidates data previously stored in the Historic Property Data (HPD) as NRS, Stat-Dat, and Prg-Reference-Number.</p> <p><b>Status codes</b> are assigned to reflect the resource’s assessment on associated date. Most evaluations involve the National Register of Historic Places, the California Register of Historical Resources, or local government criterion. The status codes are on pages 5 through 7 of this document.</p> <p><b>Evaluation date</b> should capture when the evaluation (or registry listing, if applicable) was finalized.</p> <p><b>Evaluation identifier</b> is an ID associated with the evaluation ID, assigned by OHP or NPS.</p>

## STATUS CODES

### I. Background

The Office of Historic Preservation (OHP) initially created the National Register Status Codes in 1975 as a tool to classify historical resources in the state's inventory that had been identified through a regulatory process or local government survey. Implicit within the status codes was a hierarchy reflecting the level of identification, evaluation and designation to which a resource had been analyzed. The codes did not always convey the significance of the resource for purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The State Legislature enacted the California Register of Historical Resources (CRHR) in 1998. Under the provisions of that legislation, the following resources are automatically included in the California Register:

- Resources formally determined eligible for, or listed in, the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) through federal preservation programs administered by the Office of Historic Preservation, including the National Register program; the Tax Certification program; National Historic Preservation Act Section 106 reviews of federal undertakings;
- State Historical Landmarks (SHL) numbered 770 or higher; and
- Points of Historical Interest (PHI) recommended for listing in the California Register by the State Historical Resources Commission.

For the purposes of CEQA, resources eligible for or listed in the CRHR are, by definition, "historical resources." Additionally, resources included in or deemed eligible for a local register of historical resources, including resources given a status code 3-5 in a survey meeting OHP's requirements, are presumed to be historically or culturally significant for purposes of CEQA.

In order to simplify the identification, evaluation, and understanding of California's historic resources and better promote their recognition and preservation, the status codes have been revised to clarify CRHR and Master List submissions.

### II. Understanding the Status Codes

Users of the status codes should keep in mind that the status codes are broad indicators that in most cases, serve as a starting place for further consideration and evaluations. Because the assigned status code reflects an opinion or action taken at a specific point in time, the assigned status code may not accurately reflect the resource's eligibility for the NRHP, CRHR, or local listing or later designation.

Individuals and agencies attempting to identify and evaluate historical resources need to consider the basis for evaluation upon which a particular code was assigned, i.e., date of evaluation, the reason and criteria applied for evaluation, the age of the resource at

the time of evaluation, and any changes that may have been made to the resource that would impact its integrity. Keep in mind that:

- Older surveys and evaluations were biased towards architectural values (NRHP Criteria C and CRHR 3). Resources may not have been evaluated for significance for their association with important events or people or their information potential.
- Identification and evaluation of resources for Section 106 compliance does not involve evaluations for the CRHR or any local designations.
- The NRHP generally excludes resources less than fifty years old, therefore resources that were once determined ineligible for the NRHP because they were less than 50 years of age should be reevaluated for eligibility after they have aged.
- Our understanding of historical significance changes over time. There is now a greater appreciation and understanding of social and cultural history than in earlier years. Understanding of the importance of cultural landscapes and resources of the recent past is evolving as historic preservationists are grappling with how to recognize and characterize these types of resources.

- 2D2 Contributor to a multi-component resource determined eligible for NR by consensus through Section 106 process. Listed in the CR.
- 2D3 Contributor to a multi-component resource determined eligible for NR by Part I Tax Certification. Listed in the CR.
- 2D4 Contributor to a multi-component resource determined eligible for NR pursuant to Section 106 without review by SHPO. Listed in the CR.
- 2S Individually determined eligible for NR by the Keeper. Listed in the CR.
- 2S2 Individually determined eligible for NR by consensus through Section 106 process. Listed in the CR.
- 2S3 Individually determined eligible for NR by Part I Tax Certification. Listed in the CR.
- 2S4 Individually determined eligible for NR pursuant to Section 106 without review by SHPO. Listed in the CR.
- 2CB Determined eligible for CR both individually and as a contributor to a CR eligible multi-component resource by the SHRC.
- 2CD Contributor to a multi-component resource determined eligible for CR by the SHRC.
- 2CS Individually determined eligible for CR by the SHRC.

### **3 Appears eligible for National Register (NR) or California Register (CR).**

- 3B Appears eligible for NR both individually and as a contributor to a NR eligible multi-component resource like a district through survey evaluation.
- 3D Appears eligible for NR as a contributor to a NR eligible multi-component resource through survey evaluation.
- 3S Appears eligible for NR individually through survey evaluation.
- 3CB Appears eligible for CR both individually and as a contributor to a CR eligible multi-component resource through survey evaluation.
- 3CD Appears eligible for CR as a contributor to a CR eligible multi-component resource through survey evaluation.
- 3CS Appears eligible for CR individually through survey evaluation.

### **4 Appears eligible for National Register (NR) or State Historical Landmark (CHL) through PRC§ 5024**

- 4CM State agency owned resource added to Master List - appears to meet NR and/or CHL criterion.

### **5 Recognized as Historically Significant by Local Government**

- 5B Locally significant both individually (listed, eligible, or appears eligible) and as contributor to a multi-component resource like a district that is locally listed, designated, determined eligible, or appears eligible through survey evaluation.
- 5D1 Contributor to a multi-component resource that is listed or designated locally.
- 5D2 Contributor to a multi-component resource that is eligible for local listing or designation.
- 5D3 Appears to be a contributor to a multi-component resource that appears eligible for local listing or designation.



- 5S1 Individually listed or designated locally.
- 5S2 Individually eligible for local listing or designation.
- 5S3 Appears to be individually eligible for local listing or designation through survey evaluation.

## **6 Not Eligible for Listing or Designation as specified**

- 6C Determined ineligible for or removed from California Register (CR) by the SHRC.
- 6CD Determined ineligible for or removed from CR by the SHRC as a component of a CR listed multi-component resource. [Code to differentiate a resource that has more than one CR evaluation. Example, a resource that is on the CR as both contributor to a district and individually would still be on the CR if the district was removed/determined ineligible. This code would convey the change of a specific evaluation rather than the resource's CR status.]
- 6J State Historic Landmarks (CHL) or State Points of Historical Interest (SPHI) determined ineligible for or removed as a CHL or SPHI by the SHRC.
- 6L Determined ineligible for local listing or designation through local government review process; may warrant special consideration in local planning.
- 6T Determined ineligible for NR through Part I Tax Certification process.
- 6U Determined ineligible for NR pursuant to Section 106 without review by SHPO.
- 6W Removed from NR by the Keeper.
- 6X Determined ineligible for NR by the SHRC or the Keeper.
- 6Y Determined ineligible for NR by consensus through Section 106 process – Not evaluated for CR or local listing.
- 6Z Found ineligible for NR, CR or local designation through survey evaluation.
- 6WM Removed from Master List because no longer state owned.
- 6XM Removed from Master List because of historic feature loss or further evaluation.
- 6YM State agency owned resource determined ineligible for Master List.

## **7 Not Evaluated for National Register (NR) or California Register (CR) or Needs Re-evaluation**

- 7E Treated as eligible for the purpose of OHP review.
- 7J Received by OHP for evaluation or action but not yet evaluated.
- 7K Submitted to OHP for action but not reevaluated.
- 7L State Historical Landmarks 1-769 – that do not meet CR criteria.
- 7M Submitted to OHP but not evaluated - referred to NPS.
- 7N Needs to be reevaluated - formerly coded as may become NR eligible with specific conditions.
- 7N1 Needs to be reevaluated (former status code 4) - may become NR eligible with restoration or other specific conditions.
- 7P State Point of Historical Interests that do not meet CR criteria.
- 7R Identified in Reconnaissance Level Survey or in an Area of Potential Effect (APE): Not evaluated.
